
NATURAL POOL TRAIL

Guana Bay to Point Blanche



Occasionally wild
Red-Footed Tortoises and
introduced Green or Vervet
monkeys can also be seen in
this area. You will see many
Turk's Head Cacti, a short
round cactus with a red
bristly cap on its top, looking
like a fez hat. The cacti, also
known as the Pope's Head
Cacti, can be found clinging
to rocks as well as among
the dry scrub. The tiny red
fruits are edible.



This coastal trail is punctuated by dramatic cliffs and open grasslands. You will likely see many iguanas along the way and some say that is how Guana Bay got its name. The trail passes the largest natural pool in Sint Maarten, which can be reached by scrambling down a rocky cliff area. It's worth a swim but don't forget swim shoes as there are plenty of sharp sea urchins.

The rocky shoreline is a rich source of food for birds such as the strong-billed American Oystercatcher (known locally as the Whelk Cracker) and crabs, including the colorful, algae-eating Sally Lightfoot Crab.
